





Phase III: UNC System Office Approval What Review Happens at System Office?

- UNC Policy 400.1 Governs Academic Planning (view online)
 - Policy places state needs above all else in academic program planning: The campuses, System, and the Board "shall be guided by the needs of the people of North Carolina in their academic degree program development, approval, and discontinuation actions."
- Academic Program Considerations
 - Current: List of ~12 criteria for consideration
 - Future: Return on Investment (ROI)?



Phase IV: Implementation of Approved Programs
